The Risks from Radium



ODNR was recently forced to release the results of tests they conducted on the

radioactivity of oilfield waste that is being trucked into rural Ohio counties like Coshocton. Our community has been made into a major disposal zone for this waste. It is injected beneath our aquifers and spread on our roads ostensibly to control dust and ice. This waste has been promoted as harmless "brine" by the oil and gas industry who were comparing it to the ingredients found in ice cream. This deceptive narrative has been thoroughly discredited by ODNR's own test results.

Dangerously high levels of radioactive Radium have been found in all the wells tested. When Radium enters your body it is processed like calcium and deposited in your bones. It causes cancer by releasing radiation that makes harmful changes to surrounding cells resulting in abnormal growth and tissue damage.

Radium remains hazardous for centuries. It takes 1600 years for it to lose just half of its radioactive strength. When it is repeatedly released into the environment it builds up and accumulates over time. It doesn't go away. It is soluble in water so when it is spread on roads it drains off into ponds, creeks, wells, and spring houses contaminating rural drinking water supplies.

Working people fought the battle against Radium and corporate greed back in the 1920's. 100 years later we have to fight it again.

At that time young girls were hired to paint clock and watch face numerals with Radium paint. They were told to keep their brush tips pointed by licking the bristles then dipping the brush in the paint. Each time they did this they ingested a small quantity of Radium. Their health was decimated and they became known as the "Radium Girls."
